

RULE FOR CONTRIBUTORS TO BREIFNE JOURNAL

- All contributors are asked to forward articles to the editor of the *Breifne* journal who will then decide if a particular article is suitable for publication in the journal.
- Articles, including footnotes, should be no more than 10,000 words long. However, at the editor's discretion, longer articles may on occasion be accepted. As an alternative to an article not being published due to its length, the editor may propose that it be divided into sections for publication in successive issues of the journal.
- Articles for the journal are accepted at the discretion of the editor, who may send submissions to an outside and anonymous reader for consultation. This reader will recommend whether or not the article should be published in the journal. In these cases, the reader's decision will be final; a reader's report can be requested by potential contributors whose work was sent to an outside reader.
- All images and copyrights must be sourced by the contributors. *Cumann Seanchais Bhreifne* will not provide subventions towards securing images and/or their copyrights.
- The referencing style of the *Breifne* journal must be adhered to. Failure to do so may result in a delay in the publication of the article or in the article being refused altogether. In certain cases, such as articles by archaeologists, the Harvard Style of referencing may be used, but the final decision in this and all other matters relating to the journal will be made by the editor.
